NAB Schools First Grant



Our School was fortunate to receive a grant of \$25000 from NAB for a submission that was developed in partnership with a local community organisation to improve a target program the school was running or would like to develop.

Our submission was developed in consultation with Gloucester AECG to provide students (initially Aboriginal students) with a designated support centre that caters to their learning styles and provides significance and relevant context to engage them within the classroom environment, to improve attendance and academic outcomes.

The AECG will be able to support Aboriginal students and parents to provide programs based on local Aboriginal history and culture, that engage students, improve student attendance, enrich whole school curriculum and provide positive role models and mentors with whom they can build relations within the community.

I would like to thank NAB for the opportunity to apply for such a grant, that will benefit the whole school community.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



This week's report has a lot of information that may be of interest to many families. Firstly, can I draw your attention to the Local Schools Local Decisions flier located within this newsletter. The O'Farrell State Government has increased local decision making within schools as a major part of its education platform. What this means for individual schools is still very much a matter of some speculation. We are currently in the consultation phase of the process, so, if you would like input, please take note of the opportunities

presented within the flier and have your say.

As you are aware, the Federal Government has funded Chaplaincy programs within schools for the past three years. During this time, the GHS Parents and Citizens' Association has overseen the distribution of these funds to support the Chaplaincy. We are now at the point where our current funding runs out and, as a school community, we need to decide whether to apply for a continuation of the funding, and whether the funding is used to support a Chaplain or a Welfare Worker. Submissions are due by Friday 9 December. A meeting to discuss these issues will be held in the school library on Thursday 17 November at 7:00 pm and is open to all members of the school community.

I'd like to take a moment to welcome a new member of staff to the school. After a rigorous merit selection process, our new Head Teacher (Mathematics) has been appointed. He is Mr Philip Dowle, currently HT (Mathematics) at Narabeen Sports High School. Philip has a wealth of experience and is excited about joining the Gloucester High community. Welcome, Philip! We look forward to a fruitful partnership. The processes to select a HT (Science), a HT (TAS) and a classroom Mathematics teacher are all underway.

We all know that being a parent is very rewarding, but can sometimes be difficult and stressful. *Parent Line* is a not for profit organisation whose funds go primarily into direct service. They have a website for parents, carers and professionals (www.parentline.org.au) with a range of tip sheets for parents about contemporary issues facing families today, some parenting stories written by their counselling team that normalise parenting challenges and some links to other NSW wide services.

Australian Mathematics Competition

This year Gloucester High School had 23 students sit the 34th AMC held on 4 August.

Hundreds of thousands of students from over 40 countries entered this competition. Students from Year 3 to Year 12 compete on the same day, making it possibly one of the largest single events on the Australian Education calendar. An Australian initiative, the AMC was introduced in 1978 as the first competition of its kind in schools here. It is now a truly international competition, which tests everything from basic numeracy skills through to advanced problem solving.

Of those 23 students we received 1 Hugh Distinction, 5 Credits, 9 Proficiency and 8 Certificates of Participation.

Jack Skelton in Year 11 was our most outstanding achiever this year, receiving a High Distinction (he was in the top 2% of all those who sat for the senior level).

Well done to all students who sat for the AMC. We hope that you and other capable students will sit for the competition next year. Congratulations!

What are we doing with the feedback received?

The collection of the feedback has been happening throughout the consultation. After each face-to-face forum, School Education Directors have been sending the completed feedback sheets into the State Office. All of the comments and suggestions from these consultations, the online forum and written submissions are being logged and entered into a database.

It is anticipated that an interim report will be published in the week of 7 November and will inform you about how the consultations have been conducted, how many sessions we have held for principals, teachers, parents, students and other groups.

The report will provide some early information about emerging themes. It is not unusual for a consultation to highlight some areas where there is more interest and some area where there is less.

The interim report will identify areas that require further conversations around the individual themes and the implications for our schools, regions and state office.

What will follow this interim report?

Opportunities to attend further consultation meetings, join the online forum and provide a written response will continue until the consultation ends on 18 November.

During December and January the feedback will be analysed and considered to inform our next steps.


