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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



In this report, I'd like to mention some of the major projects and programs that we're pursuing through to the end of this year and into 2013. In terms of infrastructure work, we have a submission in to refurbish Room 19 to create seminar spaces and a more useful classroom. This is currently in its last stage

of approval and we should know if we can go ahead before the end of the year. We are also very keen to upgrade the Ag Farm facilities (particularly the yards area) to create a modern and flexible area to meet our stock handling needs. While we have a submission in with the Department of Education that we would love to get some funding from, we cannot rely on this occurring and are seeking other sources of funding to get started sooner! More news on this one at the beginning of next year. On the "new school bus" front, we are nearing our target of \$40000, and recently got a donation from Jane Westcott, Maureen Hjorth, Lisa Hollingsworth, Joanna Radford and Kerry Gardiner, of \$600 following the Recycled Fashion fundraiser recently held. Thanks, ladies, for your generosity. With a bit more fundraising, we aim to have the bus purchased hopefully by the end of Term 1 2013. Can I take the opportunity to thank all those staff, students, parents and community members who are consistently thinking about improving facilities for our students in a variety of creative ways. Please keep the innovative ideas coming!

Currently, we have a variety of people from the DEC and the local community exploring ways of better catering for students who may be at risk of suspension, avoiding school attendance or otherwise disengaged with the schooling process. We are at the "brainstorming" stage and hope to get a more complete idea of what this program looks like closer to the end of the year. Again, more news on this as it comes to hand.

Teaching and executive staff have been working hard on developing streamlined processes for Teacher Professional Support programs for 2013 and beyond. I am proud of the efforts and professionalism of my staff and I am impressed with their engagement into developing their own practice. Our theme, "Making good practice better", will be particularly important in light of planning for the implementation of new syllabus documents in Mathematics, English, History and Science for 2014. We will certainly be busy, but we're approaching this as a great opportunity to design our practices to cater for the 21st Century learner!

As you can see, there's plenty going on and plenty more to think about. I'll keep you posted!

BAKER SHIELD CRICKET

Last Monday, the Gloucester High School Baker Shield cricket side played against Great Lakes College Forster in Round 3 of the U/14 competition.

After losing the toss and being asked to bowl, Gloucester made an early breakthrough with Ben Reynolds removing one of the Forster openers. A couple of dropped catches proved costly in the ensuing overs with Forster breezing to 50 before a direct hit run out from Ben Reynolds secured Gloucester's second wicket. A series of solid partnerships and some wayward bowling saw Gloucester chasing 213 for victory. The best bowlers of the day were Ben Reynolds who finished with 3/48 and a late spell from Coen Durbidge who picked up 2/19.

Gloucester's run chase saw two early wickets fall (Coen Durbidge for 11 and Jye Barkwill for 4). Ben Reynolds provided some resistance scoring 20 and Blake Steadman 10 but a steady flow of wickets saw Gloucester eventually all out for 71.

GLOUCESTER HIGH SCHOOL POLICY FOR SENIOR STUDENT DRIVERS

Gloucester High School is committed to the wellbeing of its students, and appreciates that, if handled carelessly, cars and kids sometimes don't mix. In response to recent student questions, we offer the following set of guidelines to ensure that parents and students are fully aware of the school's stance regarding senior student drivers. All prospective senior drivers will be given this note over the coming days.

Gloucester High School's policy for senior student drivers is as follows:

- 1. ALL student drivers must have permission from a parent/carer to drive to and from school. This permission can be provided in the form of a signed letter from home or the slip below can be completed and returned to the office.
- 2. Students should be aware that they can only drive to and from school and are not permitted to use their vehicles to leave the school during the school day.
- 3. Students who transport siblings will need to provide a signed letter from home or the slip below can be completed and returned to the office.
- 4. Students who wish to transport a friend will need to provide a signed letter from their parent/carer, a signed letter from their friend's parent/carer, a copy of registration for the motor vehicle and COMPREHENSIVE insurance details.

CHAPLAIN'S CHAT

What does a school chaplain do?

A chaplain has a broad but clearly defined role within a school setting. The role of chaplain is to assist in providing pastoral care, and general emotional, spiritual support and comfort to students and staff. The chaplain works with the staff in carrying out this role within the school community. A key element of this role is assisting the principal and staff in the delivery of school welfare services.

The core work of schools is education/learning. Promotion and protection of the emotional wellbeing of students is an important element of school life. Special care for the healthy psycho/social development of students is a key element in the development of healthy attitudes towards learning. In particular in a high school setting during the adolescent years, students are in an ever- changing physical, emotional and social scene. A chaplain promotes and supports good health and wellbeing during these times of change and growth. Particular programs such as Seasons for Growth and resilience training are a part of the core work of chaplaincy in assisting emotional well-being. These social and emotional learning programs have positive effects in the development of social-emotional skills such as stress management and emotional recognition. Assisting students to understand and make good choices when emotions threaten to flare out of control is a key factor. The development of healthy self-esteem supports their ability to be successful learners during their maturing years.

Chaplains have to have a good working knowledge of childhood development, and work closely and in cooperation with all staff. Chaplains have a good working knowledge of the risks to student wellbeing and work closely with other community and professional services such as counsellors, social workers and community development officers. Chaplains are skilled in understanding the roles of other professionals and in discerning when referrals to professional staff are warranted. Chaplains adhere to a clearly defined Code of Conduct and are supervised in the role.

As chaplain of Gloucester High School, it is my privilege to be an integral part of this vibrant teaching and learning community where care of the students at every level is given the highest priority.


DIGITAL SWITCH OVER 30 DAYS TO GO!

Only 30 days to go for Northern New South Wales to be digital ready.




Northern New South Wales will be the sixth region to switch and will join more than 1.6 million households already enjoying digital-only free-to-air TV.




