MANNING T20 CRICKET

Last Wednesday, Gloucester High School entered 2 sides in the Manning Zone T20 Cricket Competition run by Cricket NSW. The competition, based on school years was divided into Year 7/8 and Year 9/10 teams.

Gloucester's Year 9/10 team played Taree High School in their first game of the day, amassing 150 runs from 16 overs. Ryan Yates retired on 54, Ken Wamsley and Nathan Butler both scoring 24, while Callan Radford (20 not out) and Jack Yates (8 not out) finished the innings. In reply, Taree was bowled out for 27. Josh Startin getting the 3 wickets in the first over and finishing with 3/2 off 2 overs. Ryan Dixon (2/9), Justin Steadman (2/8) and James Yates (1/7) were the other wicket takers. In the second game, Gloucester faced much stiffer opposition in Great Lakes College Tuncurry. Tuncurry batted first making 7/73 off their 16 overs. Ryan Dixon (2/8) again starred with the ball along with Josh Startin (1/4) and Callan Radford (1/5). Jack Yates also claimed a wicket as well as two run outs. Gloucester in reply made the necessary runs in 10 overs. Ryan Yates made a well compiled 44 not out, Callan Radford (8) and Josh Startin (6) assisting Ryan. Even though the Year 9/10 won both their games, unfortunately their net run rate fell just short to win the day overall.

Abbreviations used in this report:

SEG – School Education Group (Those schools within our local group, including GLC Forster Campus, GLC Tuncurry Campus, Bulahdelah CS, Wingham HS)

SSG – Similar Schools Group (Those schools who share similar socio-economic and demographic characteristics to our own)
 R – Region (All high schools within the North Coast Region, stretching from Bulahdelah to the Qld border)

Performances of our Year 7 students on the NAPLAN test have led to these results:

- An above State, SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 9 (the top Band) in Reading
- An above SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 9 (the top Band) in Writing; Spelling; Grammar& Punctuation; and Number Patterns & Algebra
- An above State, SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 8 (the 2nd top Band) in Data, Measurement, Space & Geometry
- An above SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 8 (the 2nd top Band) in Writing; Grammar & Punctuation; Numeracy; Data, Measurement, Space & Geometry and Number Patterns & Algebra
- Average Growth in Reading; Spelling; Grammar & Punctuation; and Numeracy all well above State Average

In summary, Gloucester High School showed pleasing results in the upper Bands of most areas in Year 7 when compared to local schools and statistically similar schools. We showed very strong growth in all areas where growth data is available, indicating strong improvement.

Performances of our Year 9 students on the NAPLAN test have led to these results:

- An equal or above State, SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 10 (the top Band) in Grammar & Punctuation
- An above SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 10 (the top Band) in Reading; and Data, Measurement, Space & Geometry
- An above SEG, SSG and R average number of students achieved Band 9 (the 2nd top Band) in Reading; Writing; Spelling; Numeracy; and Number Patterns & Algebra
- Average Growth In Reading; and Spelling all above State
 Average
- Average Growth in all areas was above SEG average growth

In summary, Gloucester High School showed pleasing results in the upper Bands of many areas in Year 9 when compared to local schools and statistically similar schools. We showed very strong growth in Reading and Spelling, indicating strong improvement in these areas. While performing better than the SEG average for growth in Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy, we are still slightly below State average growth in these areas.

INFORMATION ABOUT MEASLES

Sydney is currently experiencing an outbreak of measles which began in April 2012 and is centred in the South Western Sydney and Western Sydney regions. Many of the cases have been high school students, with a smaller number in primary school. There is potential for the measles outbreak to spread further given young people have large social networks both within and outside of school.

NSW Health advises that measles is a serious viral illness that mainly affects unvaccinated children, teenagers, young adults, and babies too young to be vaccinated. Measles is highly infectious and can easily spread through the air.

Immunisation is effective in preventing the disease. In Australia, infants and young children are vaccinated with measles-mumps-rubella vaccine at 12 months and 4 years of age. People who are at risk of measles include:

- Infants <12 months who are too young to have been routinely vaccinated
- Older children who have not received 2 doses of measlescontaining vaccine

• Adults born during or after 1966 who have not received 2 doses of measles-containing vaccine and haven't had measles infection in the past.

Immunising older siblings and non-immune adults will help prevent the spread of infection to infants who are too young to be vaccinated and who are at risk of severe disease.

The first sign of measles is a high fever which usually begins about 10 to 12 days after exposure to a person with measles (range 7-18 days). A runny nose, cough, red and watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and small white spots inside the cheeks can develop in the initial stage. The rash appears around 14 days after exposure, usually starting on the face and upper neck and spreading over the body, hands and feet. The rash lasts for 4-7 days.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

People with measles are usually infectious from just before the symptoms begin until four days after the rash appears. If you have had contact with someone who has had measles and develop a fever, runny nose, cough, red and watery eyes, it may be measles and seek medical advice.

If you suspect measles, see your doctor, clinic or hospital. It is important to ring before your consultation so you can be seen as soon as possible and arrangements can be made to avoid contact with other patients in the waiting room who may be susceptible to measles. A person with measles should remain at home until four days after the rash appears to reduce the possibility of spreading it to other people.

YEAR 12 FAREWELL ASSEMBLY SPEECH
