GLOUCESTER SCHOOLS TRI CHALLENGE 2013

Gloucester High School's Tri Challenge is a unique event that began about the same time as the Gloucester Mountain Man Tri Challenge. The 2013 Tri Challenge, held on the last day of Term 3, was a great success once again with 31 individuals and 16 teams completing the 9km bike ride, 4km kayak and 4 km run. Well over 150 students were on the course as marshalls, cheering on the competitors. The 20th running of the event saw a slight change with the kayak leg starting below the Rocky Crossing causeway due to the river being low.

First to complete the course in a time of 1h:17m:37s was senior male Shelby Green. He was followed in close succession by junior males Ryan Yates (1h:17m:52s), Lachlan Clarke (1h:18m:25s), and senior males Tom Redman (1h:18m:25s), and Mitch Kellner (1h:18m:29s).

The first individual female home and 12th overall was Natalie Williams (1h:23m:35s) followed by Kate Radford (1h:31m:09s).

The first team to complete the course in 14th overall was the Year 8 mixed team of Jacob Bird, Emmeline Moulds and Bryce Lacey (1h:27m:34s). The first male team was Trae Cooper (bike, kayak) and Tom Wood (run) in 16th overall (1h:29m:21s). The first female team made up of Year 7 girls,

I sometimes speak about the concept of being a life-long learner. I try to promote with students the idea that learning is a continuum that starts at birth and continues for the rest of our lives. Thinking that learning stops at the end of your "formal" education undersells the great potential for continual growth that exists in all of us. I like to think of endings becoming new beginnings. Take, for instance, our Class of 2013. Year 12 are currently completing their HSC exams – the culmination of their secondary education. The new beginning for each of our Year 12 students will take the form of further university study, training or entry into the workforce. Even a gap year should be treated as a chance to learn and grow into the world around you. Another example was evident yesterday when our current Year 6 students, nearing the end of their primary years, attended the great transition activities offered by the GHS staff, thus taking their first steps

into the next phase of the continuum. I then think of my brother who, at age 50, has decided to undertake a new and unfamiliar career. And then there's my mother who, at 85, is planning her next art exhibition! These examples are a source of reflection and inspiration for me, and I hope they are for you. I find myself contemplating "What next?" Perhaps a short course at TAFE or adult learning? Maybe I'll learn how to juggle? I've always wanted to do that. Bus driver's license? Who knows. The important thing is to never forget the capacity of us all to keep on learning and to keep on growing. It's never too late!!

IMPORTANT UPDATE FOR YEAR 10 PARENTS AND STUDENTS

A year meeting was held on Tuesday 15 October where the following issues were discussed:

- Students who are planning to leave school at the end of Year 10 (i.e. not coming back into Year 11) must sit a numeracy and literacy examination for their RoSA certificate. The examinations are completed online and will be held in November. Students are asked to see Mr Cavanagh as soon as possible about this matter.
- Students should be beginning to plan their study and revision program for the upcoming yearly examination in Week 6 from Monday 11 to Friday 15 November.
- Peer support training will be held in Week 4 for all Year 10 students. Training involves one school day and will be held at the Baptist Church Hall. Once training has been completed, interested students can apply to be a peer support leader to work with the incoming Year 7 2014 students.
- Mr DeAngelis updated students on information regarding TAFE and traineeships
- A leadership/study skill day will be held later in this term for all students to assist with early preparations for Year 11 –more information will be available at a later date.
- Future leadership roles were discussed students are encouraged to be actively involved in their school and or local community to develop skills that may assist with future leadership roles (i.e. school leadership such as SRC, Captain, House Captain)
- Year 11 jumpers a number of students have expressed interest in being part of the organising committee to
 design the Year 11 jumper. Estimated cost for a jumper will be \$85, which includes the jersey, school crest,
 number and name on the back (maximum of 12 characters including spaces), Year 12 2014 and student name
 on the front.
- An order for the jumpers will be placed early Term 1 2014 more information will be provided to the students later this term.

ESSENTIAL SECONDARY SCIENCE ASSESSMENT

This is for Year 8 students which will be held be Monday 11 November 2013. The test takes approximately 80 minutes. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSAonline.

ESSAonline contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on

Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW Science Years 7-10 syllabus. Students will be tested on their:

- Knowledge and understanding of science
- Understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- Ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- Ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values.

Since students complete ESSAonline on a computer, each student needs to bring headphones or earbuds that plug into a school computer. Earbuds for an ipod portable player are suitable.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact the school to discuss special provisions or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2014. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/ carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test. You will be invited to complete a parent survey about the test and science learning.




