## DUKE OF ED BRONZE TRIP REPORT

On Friday 25 October 2013, seven students from Years 9 and 10 took to the Great Australian Bush, on (for most of them) their first overnight bushwalk. Led by myself and Mrs Hogan, and accompanied by Mrs Cavanagh and Mrs Hogan's son Jaya, the group travelled about 6 km on Friday evening, camping at Little Murray campsite. A freezing -5 degree night saw us dusting off various layers of ice in the morning, trying desperately to warm up before the long day ahead. A brisk 7.5 km stroll ended with the welcome sight of Junction Pools, where tents were pitched, snacks were eaten and a brief rest had before the afternoon's walking took place. An 11 km loop took us around Edwards Swamp, up to Carey's Peak (where lunch was eaten with some fervour!) then around Black Swamp, over Aeroplane Hill and back to Junction Pools. A quick wade in the cool waters of the Barrington River helped to soothe sore muscles and restore feeling to swollen feet! Another freezing night (this one colder than Friday night!!) had many of the party telling of internal tent ice falls and lack of sleep. Undaunted, however, we continued our walk, retracing our steps to the carpark on Sunday morning.

As one of the leaders of this trip, I want to commend all participants on their efforts and willingness to be a part of everything that was going on. I will end with an email I received from my wife who, as Principal of Nabiag Public School, is always a keen observer of the enthusiasm of youth:

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



As our Year 12 students approach the end of their HSC exams, students in other years are preparing for their own end of year exams. To gain the best possible results in these exams, students need to make sure of a few important things:

- Make sure you find out from your teacher exactly which topics or content areas are included in the exam
- Participate actively in the revision activities that happen in your classes – exercise your brain, don't expect the knowledge to be "poured in"
- Allocate some time at home every day to revise the work you have done – 10 to 15 minutes a day per subject will see improvement
- Find out early what you don't understand, then go to your teacher and ask them to help
- Talk to your parents about what you know – telling someone else will help you to learn and remember it!

Good luck to all (and remember: the harder you work the better luck you will have!)

And now to another matter. Many of you will know that the DER Laptop program for students has been discontinued. This means that Year 9 students will not be provided with a laptop, as has been the case for the last few years. Many High Schools are embarking on a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program, in which families purchase devices for their children to use at school and at home. Recent meetings with staff, students and parents have all led to the acknowledgement that, if purchases are made by parents, that the school needs to provide some guidelines surrounding the type and capacity of device that we think will meet student educational needs and can cope with the wireless and software demands that exist. Our current thinking is that Year 9 students **will** need a device. Parents may also choose to purchase devices for students in Years 7 and 8. While the school encourages this, we realise that the expense may be prohibitive and, therefore, won't be making this compulsory. Chris Moulds, our invaluable TSO, is in the process of compiling a specifications list, so that parents can be well-informed about what a purchased device should have. This list should be complete within the next few days, and will be published on the website and in the next newsletter. We will also notify parents through email that this is available. We encourage parents to take this list with them when looking for a device, to avoid the disappointment and expense of purchasing something that may not meet requirements.

## RESILIENCE FOR LEARNING HUB PILOT BEGINS

It is with great excitement that I announce the beginning of a pilot period for the Gloucester High School Resilience for Learning Hub. What is the Hub? It is an off-site facility designed to re-engage students who have had difficulty in mainstream classes, by focusing on achievement of literacy and numeracy goals, social skill development and by facilitating some work in the community. The Hub will be staffed for three days each week with a qualified and capable teacher and a Student Learning and Support Officer, and will be “fed into” by community experts and volunteers. I have been overwhelmed by the support given to this project by school staff and the wider community. The teaching staff for the pilot will be Mr David Garland, Mr Mik Wisely and Mr Adam Cameron, while the SLSO role will be shared by Mrs Anne Martin and Mrs Janelle Davis. The huge job of organisation has been thoroughly met by Ms Trudi Edman, Head Teacher Wellbeing, with some fantastic behind the scenes work from Mr Mike King, Mr Michael DeAngelis, Mrs Lorraine Forbes and Mrs Margo Cameron. All these staff have given up a considerable amount of their preparation time to support the Hub, and for this I thank them sincerely.

Having spoken to a number of community individuals and groups, I am confident that the Resilience for Learning Hub will promote a “whole of village” approach to the future of our town’s students. During this pilot period of 5 weeks, we will continue to seek the support and involvement of the wider community. Following this trial, a formal report will support future applications for funding. I thank Mr Tony Tersteeg for making the facility available to us so cheaply, and the Gloucester High School P&C for agreeing to assist with rental payments. I also thank Mr Geoff Marshall for his support.

My excitement about the potential of the Resilience for Learning Hub is matched only by the pride I have in the enthusiasm and hard work that all involved have displayed. The success of projects such as this one illustrates clearly the vibrancy and heart of a school within its community – a school that continues to achieve amazing things!

# YEAR 6 TRANSITION PROGRAM

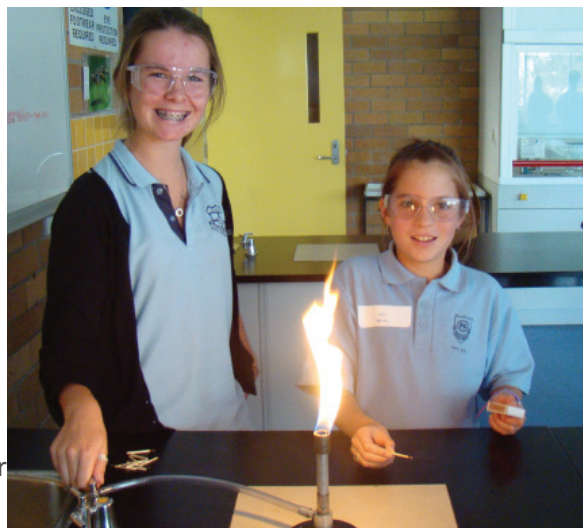
This term an exciting new transition initiative, “P to H”, has been introduced at Gloucester High School. The aim of the program is to give Year 6 students an exciting look at high school life and to encourage a more confident approach to their future transition. As a high school we wanted to improve supported movement from primary to high school for all students within our community of schools and to help students in more remote settings, meet more like minded peers.

It is a four week program where the Year 6 students attend Gloucester High School on Wednesday afternoons. They have been placed into four groups and participate in a different learning experience each visit. The aim is to engage the students in activities that allow them to develop a greater understanding of how learning works in the high school.

Year 6 students visit Gloucester High School four times- Week 2, Week 4, Week 6 and Week 8 this term on Wednesday from 1.30-3.15pm. The students are split into four groups and experience Timber Technology, Visual Arts, Drama/Library and Science.

## SNAKE TAILS INTERACTIVE REPTILE SHOW

## ESSENTIAL SECONDARY SCIENCE ASSESSMENT

On Monday 11 November 2013, Year 8 will be doing the ESSA test which takes approximately 80 minutes. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSAonline.

ESSAonline contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations.

Students will be tested on their:

- Knowledge and understanding of science
- Understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- Ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- Ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students will also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values.

Since the students will be completing ESSAonline on a computer, each student **needs to bring headphones or earbuds** that plug into a school computer.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2014. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/ carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test and you will be invited to complete a parent survey about the test and science learning .

### Rebel Girl by Ann Clancy

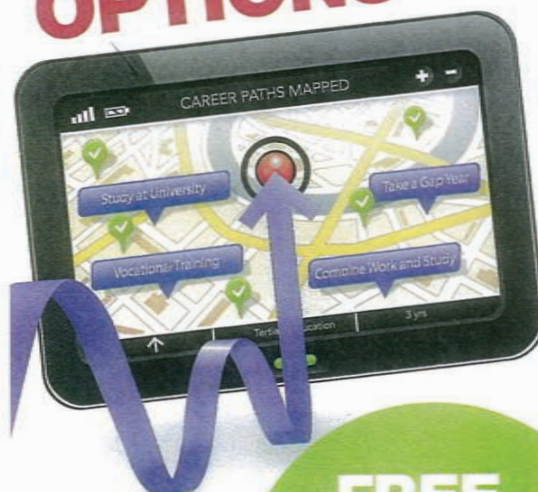
