This week, as always, I want to focus on what makes great teaching and how this leads to inspired learning. However, this week, I'd like to look at it from a slightly different angle. Seven Year 10 students recently provided me with some great information about their thoughts on Teaching and Learning, in a Student Focus Group I conducted during Week 1 of this term. Coen Durbidge, Hailey Johns, Patrick Skelton, Lily Nixon, Ryan Yates, Maddy-Roze Eveleigh and Ben Reynolds spent a couple of periods with me discussing various aspects of their learning. Essentially, they looked at aspects of the Quality Teaching framework and discussed how different Learning Styles suit different people. They then gave me some data about how they liked to learn and, importantly, how they do not like to learn. They then wrote down what they saw as a "model lesson", what made such a lesson engaging and why such a lesson would help them to learn. This data will help in our Planning process for the next three years. The Student Focus Group process (we videoed the whole thing!) will be used for training purposes across the Great Lake District – go Gloucester High School (again!)

Thanks a heap to these capable, thoughtful and enthusiastic young people for their insight, good humour and hard work. I look forward to using their contributions in moulding the future directions of Teaching and Learning at Gloucester High School.

HERE BE AMAZEMENT

Junior Book Club travelled to Event Cinemas, Glendale on Thursday 18 September to watch film adaptations of two books read by members this year. The Maze Runner, the first book in James Dashner's bestselling Maze Runner science-fiction series and The Boxtrolls, based on the children's novel Here Be Monsters by Alan Snow.

Overall, thumbs up to The Maze Runner film and a big thumbs down to The Boxtrolls. Even though they 'enjoyed the movie greatly' (Max) most agreed that The Maze Runner book was 'definitely better' (Jacob). Luke, Max and Stephen felt that The Boxtrolls was 'nowhere near the book, it was a different story' (Stephen). Elijah, on the other hand, enjoyed its 'original, easy-to-



follow plot and subtle humour throughout', Gabe thought the film 'well-constructed but it felt childish' and, even though the animation was 'good', Sian found the story 'uninteresting.'

The Maze Runner [book]: 'much more to the plot... more events happened' (Elijah); 'more engaging' (Jack); 'a better storyline and made it easy to understand the Maze' (Andrew).

The Maze Runner [film]: 'didn't follow the plot too well and, although the special effects looked good, there wasn't much character development' (Gabe); 'much darker than the book and too violent' (Stephen); 'made me see and understand more' (Sian); 'found it hard to take the film seriously because it had a comedy actor... and some of the acting was horrible' (Jack).

Azren (nearly) has the last word:

'Overall, The Maze Runner was an excellent movie. The special effects were great and there was always action. However, there were several issues with the plot. They left out key events and ideas that played a large part in the book. This was compensated by the excellent interpretation of the majority of the movie... The Boxtrolls was a great take on the classic novel Here Be Monsters. But, the plot could have been deeper – e.g. what the villain was trying to achieve.'

Current Year 11 / 12

Students will be permitted to withdraw from a non-mandatory course as of Monday 27 November (Monday Week 4). Year 12 students are required to complete ten units compared with twelve units in Year 11. Remember, once a student withdraws from a course they will not be permitted to enrol again. I encourage all students who are withdrawing from a course to have constructive dialogue with their teachers, parents and other students prior to doing so. The major consequence, particularly for students seeking an ATAR, is there will be no options to fall back on if they unexpectedly fail to achieve good results in a particular course. Subject Variation Forms can be collected from Mr De Angelis in the Careers Office.

Year 12 Graduates

Those students who are university bound will need to ensure that their School Recommendation Scheme (SRS) choice is first preference by Tuesday 2 December. Offers will be released on Thursday 4 December. After this round it's important that students go into UAC "Check and Change" and change their first preference to the university and course that they truly want. Remember, this round will be based on ATARs. Students will know their ATAR's prior to this round, so common sense and a realistic appraisal of their choices is very important. Remember, many courses and universities offer bonus points for living in a regional area, being of indigenous decent or successfully completing the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) documents. SURF'S UP! GOLD COAST PROVES TO BE A BIG HIT!

This year's new HSC Year 12 group set off early Labour Day morning on their way to the sunny and warm Gold Coast. The bus trip was long, around nine hours with 'The Big Bang Theory' keeping students occupied. Our first day in Queensland was spent at Movie World and was a great experience for all. We were greeted at the gates by two Movie World actors and they spoke with the group for around a half hour on their roles in the park's events, how to become a stuntman, principles of acting and information about Movie World. From there we let students loose on the fun park, and had arranged meeting times and contact with them



throughout the day. Students pushed their own personal boundaries by going on some of the most adrenaline pumping rides in the world. We also saw a variety of shows including 4D cinema which demonstrated modern technology and futuristic concepts for movie experiences. The caravan park we stayed in had brand new cabins and outstanding facilities including tennis courts, a swimming pool, spas and a water slide. The student's favourite was the large jumping pillow. It was a great way to burn off any extra energy left over after a full day of activities.

Day three involved learning to surf lessons. All students had some degree of nervous apprehension in the morning, which was echoed by Amy Andrews when she said 'I don't want to be bitten by a shark today'. The beach was a little windy but the surf size and conditions were ideal for our novice group. All students who surfed stood up and showed the Gold Coast what Gloucester High is made of. This event was the highlight for the students. Both teachers also had a go and enjoyed learning along with the students. From the beach we finished the day with retail therapy which was also excellent and really well appreciated by all. The students managed themselves well and were always observed being polite and respectful.

Day four was Dream World and was a great way for us to have some unique insights into the park and especially Tiger Island. Students where allowed into the park an hour earlier than regular customers and taken on a tour. We were given a talk on Tiger Island about what they do and provided with facts about tiger populations and different breeds from around the world. Students found this very interesting and handled tiger teeth, claws and a skull which made us all realises how important the moat was separating us from the real tigers. The behaviours that the trainers could encourage the tigers to do was amazing and to watch a 180kg tiger climb 10 metres up a telegraph poll was exciting. The advice given here was 'if a tiger is chasing you, don't climb a tree!' The rest of Dream World was great, with



most students going on the Tower of Terror 2 which travels at 160 kms within five seconds and was both terrifying and exhilarating. The Giant Drop went up 38 stories and then just dropped...down! Some students had the good fortune of having visited Dream World before but for most of the group these were new experiences. Again the student's behaviour was outstanding and they were always punctual, respectful and most importantly, they were having a lot of fun.

The year group achieved a number of outcomes throughout the week, including developing respect and responsibility to each other and the larger group, demonstrating maturity through

responsible actions and completion of tasks and expectations, setting goals and strategically planning their achievement, communicating within a sub group to manage living quarters for a week, managing finances and personal belongings to ensure satisfaction throughout the week and achieving success with a range of personal challenges.



Meet the Author: Siobhan Dowd

Siobhan Dowd was born in 1960 to Irish parents. She was brought up in London, but spent much of her youth visiting the family homes in Ireland. In 1998 Dowd co-founded English PEN's Readers and Writers Program. It takes authors into schools in socially deprived areas, as well as prisons, young offender institutions and community projects. An invitation in 2004 to contribute a collection of short stories for children about racism led Dowd to a new career as an author of children's books. Between 2004 and 2007, Siobhan wrote four outstanding novels for young people, all of which have won awards. For her last novel Bog Child (2009), she became the first author to be posthumously awarded the UK's premier accolade for children's writing -- the CILIP Carnegie Medal. Her final novel, A Monster Calls, was completed by Patrick Ness and published in 2011, with illustrations by Jim Kay.

Dowd died in August 2007, aged 47. In the very last days before she died, Dowd set up the Siobhan Dowd Trust (Bringing Books and Reading to Disadvantaged Young People in The UK) which works to give young people the opportunity to read and enjoy literature. It is the money earned through royalties and foreign sales of Siobhan's books that allows the Trust to support deserving projects. It was the final act of someone who had spent so much of her life working on behalf of others.


The London Eye Mystery (2007)

LAST CHANCE FOR STUDENTS TO RECEIVE VACCINATIONS AT SCHOOL

The last school based vaccination clinic at school will be held on: Thursday 13 November 2014



It is not too late for your Year 7 son or daughter, or Year 9 son to receive missed vaccine doses offered in 2014. If you have not completed a consent form, please ask the front office for one and send it back in time for the last clinic. Any missed vaccine, even a first dose of HPV can be administered at this last clinic. HPV is an expensive vaccine, and is only funded if the course is commenced in Year 7 at school.

What happens if my child has not received a full course of three doses of HPV by the end 2014 – as long as your child starts the course of HPV while they are in Year 7 in 2014 the nurses will complete their course while they are in Year 8 in 2015. You do not need to take any further action. This will however be the last opportunity for boys in Year 9 to have a HPV vaccine dose at school. Year 9 boys who have had less than three doses of HPV vaccine after this next visit can complete the schedule at their GP practice.

Your child is given a record of vaccination for each vaccine administered; you may need to ask them for this copy.

You can contact the Hunter New England Population Health Unit on 49246477 and ask for an immunisation officer if you have any questions.
