YEAR 10 DRAMA PRODUCTION

The Small Poppies

Gloucester High School's Year 10 Drama class will be going back to kindergarten when they take to the stage in the David Holman play, *The Small Poppies*. The talented group of students will present this widely acclaimed, entertaining children's drama in the **Gloucester High School Hall on Friday 12 December and Saturday 13 December.**

The Small Poppies looks at the experiences of a group of children, parents, and teachers facing the challenge of the first day at school in urban Australia. While the play includes lots of comic situations, engaging games and cheeky gags, it also attempts to incorporate some serious and more 'adult' themes about racial intolerance and Australia's emigration laws which echo the schoolroom concerns of bullying and exclusion faced by some of the characters. While it is primarily a show for children, anyone with small children or who remembers those troublesome times will find something to empathise with here.

The story is mainly focused on the troubles of five year old Clint (played by Erika Hughes), initially eager to be off to school for the first time but then challenged not only by losing his best friend Maria (Maddie Eveleigh/Tia Dougherty), who moves house, but also, when he gets there, by the class bully, Shane (Sandi Thompson/Karla Tollis). Meanwhile a Cambodian refugee, Lep (Lily Nixon) comes to Australia following the death of her mother and faces not only the standard challenges of 'big school', but language, race, and cultural barriers which prevent her classmates and teacher (Kimberley Mitchell) from understanding her.

First written in 1986, *The Small Poppies* is still a universal story in which the themes and characters are largely timeless. It is a very energetic show with a colourful set designed to reflect the bright, broad spaces of the children's world (and the dark ones in Cambodia). The school hall will be liberally decorated with children's drawings and the paraphernalia of the classroom, and the stage will accommodate the various running, dancing, jumping, and tumbling embarked upon by the cast in the course of events.

Children will be able to enjoy the simpler pleasures of watching the 'children' perform bad jokes and play out the everyday dramas of the classroom, and they will probably find the exaggerated mannerisms of the adults entirely recognisable and equally funny. Adults should also find the characters of the children reasonably accurate, based as they are upon long observation of real children by the author.

The Small Poppies is an immensely enjoyable entertainment which will have you laughing out loud with recognition and empathy more than once. Come along and re-live your first day at school. For poor little Clint, it won't be easy!

CAREERS NEWS

Current Year 11 / 12

Students will be permitted to withdraw from a non-mandatory course as of Monday 27 November (Monday Week 4). Year 12 students are required to complete ten units compared with twelve units in Year 11. Remember, once a student withdraws from a course they will not be permitted to enrol again. I encourage all students who are withdrawing from a course to have constructive dialogue with their teachers, parents and other students prior to doing so. The major consequence, particularly for students seeking an ATAR, is there will be no options to fall back on if they unexpectedly fail to achieve good results in a particular course. Subject Variation Forms can be collected from Mr De Angelis in the Careers Office.

YEAR 11 / 12 All year 12 (11) students will have a one on one meeting in the careers office during Week 4 (Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday). This meeting is a part of the School to Work Program. We will discuss Course Variations, Individual skills, and options and back-up options when leaving school next year. The meeting timetable is posted outside of the Careers Office and other places in the school. It is your responsibility to get to your scheduled meeting in a timely manner. Please see me if you are unable to attend so we can re-schedule.

Year 12 Graduates

Those students who are university bound will need to ensure that their School Recommendation Scheme (SRS) choice is first preference by Tuesday 2 December. Offers will be released on Thursday 4 December. After this round it's important that students go into UAC "Check and Change" and change their first preference to the university and course that they truly want. Remember, this round will be based on ATARs. Students will know their ATAR's prior to this round, so common sense and a realistic appraisal of their choices is very important. Remember, many courses and universities offer bonus points for living in a regional area, being of indigenous decent or successfully completing the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) documents. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you require any assistance with your preferences.

On Wednesday 15 October, Gloucester High School hosted the Manning Zone Netball Gala Day. Gloucester began the day with a game against Great Lakes College Forster and were beaten 31-10. Jenna Davis shot very well and Tayla Predebon had a great game in defence. Gloucester played Taree in the next game and was very competitive going down 23-19. Olivia Allardice was all over the court at centre and Jess Anniwell shooting at a high percentage. Wingham was Gloucester's next opponent and again Gloucester were very competitive but went down 17-12. In the last game of the day Gloucester was drawn to play Great Lakes College Tuncurry. In this game the girls again played very well but went down 24-12. The overall winners on the day was Great Lakes College Forster who were undefeated all day and progress to the next stage of the knockout competition.



U/14's Cricket

Gloucester High School's Baker Shield cricket side finally got to the play Rounds 1 and 2 of the competition last Monday at Toronto. After 3 washouts in Term 1, we nervously set off for the long journey on the school bus.

Gloucester was drawn to play West Wallsend in the first match and due to unforeseen circumstances only 1 ground was available for 4 teams. This meant a reduction in game length and games were shortened to 10 overs per side. Batting first, Gloucester made 66 from its 10 overs with Harrison Clarke scoring 40 not out. In the run chase, West Wallsend proved too strong reaching the target 1 wicket down with 2 overs remaining.

Gloucester then played in a consolation game against Morriset High School. Again batting first, Gloucester scored 38 from its 10 overs. Andrew Hughes scoring 12, Connor Harvey 4 and Julian Davis not out on 6. The Gloucester bowlers were very tight but Morriset were able to reach the total with one over to spare.

Opens Cricket

On Monday, the Open Boys cricket side travelled to Singleton to play in Round 3 of the Alan Davidson Shield. After a long trip in the bus, Captain Ryan Yates managed to win the toss and elected to bat on what looked like a good wicket. Gloucester started promisingly scoring 9 off the 1st over but opener Coen Durbidge fell for a duck in the second over. This brought Ryan Yates to the crease who looked very comfortable from the outset. He saw Gloucester's opener Brodie O'Brien go for 2 and the side was 2/16. Ryan continued to play some great cricket shots until he was caught in the gully for 15. Ben Reynolds and Ethan Hamilton set about steadying the innings and both played intelligent cricket. Ben eventually went for 11 but the innings was back on course. Callan Radford scored 9 before being caught. This brought Blake Steadman to the crease who along with Ethan Hamilton batted beautifully. Ethan scored 16 when he was unluckily caught. Blake continued to bat sensibly as wickets fell around him. Kenneth Wamsley came in at number 11 and scored a very valuable 29 to add to Blake's 26. Gloucester had reached 142 which was a defendable total.

Gloucester set about their bowling with both openers (Ben Reynolds and Ethan Hamilton) restricting the batsmen. Ethan was rewarded with an early wicket and Singleton were 1/16. Brodie O'Brien came on first change and made an immediate impact taking 3 quick wickets to have Singleton 4/41. Following this an excellent piece of individual fielding from Ryan Yates saw a run out from a direct hit and Singleton were now 5/41. Singleton steadied and formed a partnership that saw them get to 84 when Kenneth Wamsley entered the attack. Bowling left arm orthodox spin, Kenneth broke the partnership with a stumping to Coen Durbidge. Kenneth took a further 2 wickets and Ethan Hamilton the last wicket to see Singleton all out for 109.

Gloucester will know play the winner of Newcastle High School and Belmont High School in the Hunter Region semi-final for a chance to reach the final.

T20 Cricket Gala Day

Last Wednesday the 7/8 and 9/10 T20 cricket teams travelled to Taree for the rescheduled Gala day organised by Cricket NSW

The Year 7/8 team played St Clare's in their first game and scored 89 batting first. Harrison Clarke scored 50 and Justin Berry 10. St Clare's could only manage 58 in reply with Cody Longbottom taking 2/3 and Justin Berry, Cadel Beard, Jyah Bowden all taking a wicket each.

This put the 7/8 in the final against Great Lakes College. Great Lakes batted first and posted a score of 70. Andrew Hughes and Julian Davis were the pick of the bowlers taking 1 wicket each. In reply, Gloucester started in fine style with Harrison Clarke scoring 25 and Jacob Moulds contributing 4. Andrew Hughes scored 10 and Jyah Bowden 5 but Gloucester fell just short with 58 off their overs.

The 9/10 team played Wingham High School in their first game and scored 119. Ryan Yates 36, Blake Steadman 19, Jack Davis and Ben Reynolds (both 14) doing the damage with the bat. In reply, Wingham were bowled out for 90 with Ben Reynolds and Ryan Yates both taking 2 wickets, Jye Barkwill, Ben Henley and Cormac Campbell took 1 wicket each. In their second match, Gloucester again batted first scoring 120 against St Clare's. Ryan Yates scored 41, Coen Durbidge 30 and Josh Wilson 17. St Clare's scored 55 in reply with Coen Durbidge taking 2 wickets, Jye Barkwill, Ben Reynolds and Bryce Lacey all taking a wicket each.

This secured Gloucester a spot in the final against Great Lakes College. Again batting first, Gloucester scored 72. Ryan Yates 35, Coen Durbidge 22 were the main contributors with the bat. In reply, Great Lakes were able to chase down the required runs with only a few balls to spare. Jye Barkwill was the pick of the bowlers taking 2/9 and Blake Steadman keeping it tight with figures of 1/7.

VACCINATIONS AT SCHOOL

The last school based vaccination clinic at school will be held on: Thursday 13 November 2014



It is not too late for your Year 7 son or daughter, or Year 9 son to receive missed vaccine doses offered in 2014. If you have not completed a consent form, please ask the front office for one and send it back in time for the last clinic. Any missed vaccine, even a first dose of HPV can be administered at this last clinic. HPV is an expensive vaccine, and is only funded if the course is commenced in Year 7 at school.

What happens if my child has not received a full course of three doses of HPV by the end 2014 – as long as your child starts the course of HPV while they are in Year 7 in 2014 the nurses will complete their course while they are in Year 8 in 2015. You do not need to take any further action. This will however be the last opportunity for boys in Year 9 to have a HPV vaccine dose at school. Year 9 boys who have had less than three doses of HPV vaccine after this next visit can complete the schedule at their General Practitioner practice.

Your child is given a record of vaccination for each vaccine administered; you may need to ask them for this copy.

You can contact the Hunter New England Population Health Unit on 49246477 and ask for an immunisation officer if you have any questions.

MULTICULTURAL VISIT AT RISK OF CANCELLATION

The Gloucester High School Multicultural Festival is at risk of not occurring this year due to a lack of interest from host families to accommodate visiting students from Miller High School. At the time of writing this message, the due date for expressions of interest from students has expired and we have had very few students (only four from Years 10 & 11!) offering to support this venture. Unfortunately, the festival, which celebrates multiculturalism and promotes cultural tolerance and understanding, cannot proceed unless families are willing and able to care for the Miller students, most of whom are refugees from war torn countries such as Iraq and Afghanistan.

We will extend the deadline for expressions of interest to Friday November 7th in the hope that there may be some families out there who can help. As most of the visiting students are over 16 years of age, it would be preferable if hosting students were in this age range. If you think your family can help, please contact Scott Davis at the school on 6558 1605 or have your child collect an expression of interest form from Mr Davis. Please note that, due to cultural differences, some students may need to adhere to particular dietary requirements.

The Multicultural Festival is set to take place from Tuesday December 2nd to Friday December 5th. The festival will culminate in our Multicultural Day on Friday with a range of cultural food, music and events taking place in the school

and will also include a Music and Drama Night on the Thursday night.

SRC TRAINING DAY



The excursion was designed to develop leadership and teamwork skills as well as generate ideas for positive initiatives. Students began the day with a brisk walk down to the chambers before being welcomed by Mayor John Rosenbaum. They then participated in a name game 'icebreaker' prior to a very engaging address from ex-Gloucester local Fiona Walton, who now works as an intelligence analyst for the NSW Police Force. STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Missing school means your child misses out on vital information and maintaining learning routines. This can result in a loss of confidence and missing out on forming vital friendships.

Attendance is recorded each day. As a parent or caregiver you are responsible for ensuring your child attends school every day, including sports days unless your child:

- has an unavoidable medical or dental appointment (preferably these should be made after school or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious illness.

If your child has to be absent from school for any reason, including arriving late or leaving early, please either tell your child's teacher or the administration assistant at our school, or explain the reason by phone, email, or written note as soon as possible, or within seven days.

DUKE OF ED SILVER EXPEDITION

Last weekend saw seven enthusiastic students begin what would be an epic Duke of Ed expedition spanning four different maps and covering over 50 km! Beginning at the start of the link trail, we decided to check out Munro's Hut and it wasn't long before our first injury was sustained. Lily's "log roll", fortunately, only left a few scratches and bruises and we were able to sally forth!

The map indicated a leisurely 13 km from the hut to Wombat Creek, from which an extra 3 km would see us reach our first campsite of Black Swamp. The going was slow, however, due to many tree falls across the track, some quite thick undergrowth and a relentless uphill grade that made us all doubt the accuracy of the map. "This has gotta be more than 13 ks!!" The next complication was the impending thunderstorm rolling ominously in from the west. 
ASCENDANCE TRILOGY by Jennifer A. Nielsen

ESSENTIAL SECONDARY SCIENCE ASSESSMENT

The Essential Secondary Science Assessment (ESSA) test for Year 8 students, will be held for 8K and 8M on Wednesday 12 November 2014 and 8B on Thursday 13 November 2014. The test takes approximately 80 minutes. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSA online.

ESSA online contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW Science Years 7–10 Syllabus. Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete ESSA online on a computer, each student needs to bring headphones or earbuds that plug into a school computer. Earbuds for an ipod or portable player are suitable.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact the school to discuss special provision or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1, 2015. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test. You will be invited to complete a parent survey about the test and science learning.
