Tuesday came with a lazy wake up. We took a brisk walk on a rainforest circuit, where Wyatt made friends with many many ticks, he was the "tick magnet", probably because of his obsessive compulsive need to swing on every vine. Leaving Coombadjha we drove to Anvil Rock, which was a hugenormous stack of rocks. We trekked all the way to it then attempted to climb to the top, but there was no way up. Lach and Wyatt made sure. Hayley and I took photos of all the beautiful tiny flowers, including a dragon like plant which tried to "attack" Hayley as a bug flew out of by surprise. We then set up camp back at Mulligans hut where we were the first night, with flushing toilets! Beep, beep, beep, went the phones as we hadn't been in civilisation for four days. The view was again breathtaking as we could see so far that the world just disappeared. Coming back down the rocky mountain was a reflection of what had happened over the last few days. So many great memories and sights that I'll never forget.

Breakfast on the last day, "Mr Cav what were you doing in there last night, it sounded like you were playing twister?" Lach said over breakfast, food went flying everywhere as we burst with laughter.





We then took our last walk to Murrumbooee Cascades... which were a little disappointing for a 6 km walk there. But the rocks were still amazing us. Then finally it was time to say goodbye to our adventure and hello to a burger at Glen Innes. Thank you Mr Cav and Mrs Hogan for being amazing leaders and taking us on such a memorable trip!!

Remember that some solid revision work is essential if you are to give yourself the best possible chance in the exams. When you are in the hall with the exam paper in front of you, remember to take the time to read each question carefully, highlight the main parts of the question, and give the fullest answer possible. Depending on the subject, this may include showing your working out, giving one or two examples, giving your opinion backed up by evidence or explaining something in a different way. If you have time left at the

end of an exam, don't waste it. Take a few moments to read over what you've written. Are there questions you have left for later that you can now do? Can you add something to some of your other answers? Does my answer really answer the question? Over the next few weeks, when you get your exams back, it is important to listen to the teacher when they provide feedback. Take down some notes so you can improve next time. Remember the aim is to get better and better at exams as you approach the senior years and the ultimate goal of the Higher School Certificate.

Once the examination period is over, staff will be busy writing reports, which we aim to distribute to students by Wednesday 14 December. But the term is far from over! Events which are coming up include Peer Support training for Year 10 students; the continuation of our Transition activities for Yr 6 (including the Orientation Day planned for Monday 5 December); the Student Teacher Understanding Network (STUN) training day for selected Year 8 and 9 students; a Year 10 and 11 Study Skills seminar; Year 8, 9 and 10 Drama nights; the SRC's Dream, Believe, Achieve day; the grand opening of the new Trade Skills Centre on 7 December at 3:30 pm; the school's Presentation Evening (Monday 12 Dec) and the long-awaited HSC results (out on Thursday 15 December).

This includes understanding and valuing ethical practices when locating and using information as part of their HSC studies.

The program has been developed as part of the NSW Government's Respect and Responsibility strategy and complements other approaches such as brochures for teachers, students and parents and strengthened student and teacher declarations for the HSC.

The HSC: All My Own Work program is integrated with other NSW syllabuses and programs. The program is designed to be delivered flexibly as self-paced learning modules.

The program's content is divided into five modules:

- · Scholarship Principles and Practices
- Acknowledging Sources
- Plagiarism
- Copyright
- Working with others

Each module contains:

- Information and advice on the module focus questions
- Quiz questions
- Summary
- Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)
- Link to a glossary
- Links to relevant websites

In a nutshell, AMOW provides students with a contemporary and relevant understanding of how to avoid plagiarism. Please note: Students are unable to be enrolled as Year 11 Students until this requirement is fulfilled. All students will need to complete all five Module Quizzes. PEER SUPPORT PROGRAM

Our highly successful Peer Support program provides our school community with a student led approach to enhance the social and emotional development and wellbeing of our students.

Our Year 10 peer mentors are carefully selected and trained to ensure that their Year 7 buddies transition smoothly and happily into the High School environment. The activities led by the student mentors build positive relationships, encourage participation and assist younger students in taking personal responsibility and embracing lifelong learning. All activities are designed to encourage students to work collaboratively and support one another.

This year, two full training days to prepare our Peer Leaders will be held on the Monday 21 and Tuesday 22 November, held at the Baptist Church Hall. Permission notes will be sent home as soon as possible. Please note that school uniform is not required, however, comfortable and appropriate clothing for full participation in a range of activities is necessary.

YEAR 9 SCIENCE EXCURSION

Thursday 24 November, Year 9 students have the opportunity to travel to the University of Sydney to attend the Spectacular Science workshop. Students will do hands-on science activities and meet real scientists.

Spectacular Science will engage the students' interest in the huge diversity of science. Students will experience first hand some of the intriguing and important areas scientists are working on and spend a spectacular day submerged in science. From superconductivity to astronomy, they will see the process of Physics from start to finish. A day of experimentation, discovery with questions and answers.

Students will experience a wide range of classic chemistry experiments and be introduced to the world of forensic psychology. Students will have their testimony put to the test in a lie detection activity.

Year 9 will have an opportunity to handle human and animal bones, as they put a skeleton together in anatomical order, practice distinguishing between human and animal bones, and identify bones from x-rays.

The bus will depart from school at the early time of 4.00am in order for us to be at the University before 9.00am. We will have a very brief stop for breakfast on the way down and another on

our way back for dinner. It is recommended that students bring their own lunch and snacks. Full school uniform must be worn and black leather school shoes. Parents will receive a text advising our estimated time of arrival back at school in the evening.

This will be a great experience! It is hoped that students will be inspired to continue studying science in an area that interests them in their senior years of high school.

BANNED ITEMS AT GLOUCESTER HIGH SCHOOL

The following items are banned from this school site because they can:

CAREERS NEWS

YEAR 9 CAREERS STUDENTS:

Next year, during the final two weeks of Term 1, all Year 10 students will go out on Work Experience (nine days in total). Students will be given their Work Experience Forms (Student Placement Record) during Careers Lessons over the next couple of weeks. Some students are very keen and may want to organise their Work Experience over the holidays. Students are NOT permitted to complete a Work Experience over the holidays, but may make arrangements for the following term. They may choose to work for a particular employer for either one or two weeks. Most students choose 2 placements to experience more variety, but it's up to the individual. This will be discussed in detail during our lessons.

The dates designated for 2016 Year 10 Work Experience will be:

- Term 1 Week 10: 27 March 31 April (5 Days)
- Term 1 Week 11: 3 April 7 April (5 Days)

ALL MY OWN WORK

This term, during careers lessons, all Year 10 students have been completing the compulsory Modules for ALL MY OWN WORK. All 5 quizzes need to be completed by Friday December 4. The Board of Studies will not permit students who have not successfully completed all quizzes to enrol as a Year 11 student. Students need to provide evidence of completing all quizzes by printing out and submitting hard copies of the results page, OR emailing all 5 quizzes as an attachment to: michael.deangelis@det.nsw.edu.au **Students must ensure that they enter their full name before beginning each quiz and achieve at least a 85%.

University ATAR cut-offs

BONUS POINTS AND EARLY ENTRY

For some NSW schools, regional universities such as Newcastle, Charles Sturt, Southern Cross and New England all offer 'bonus ATAR' points to students based on where they attend school. These 'bonus points' are automatically calculated by the universities at the time of making offers. Sometimes this allows students to be made an offer into a course for which they did not quite achieve the published ATAR cut off rank.

In addition, some universities, including Newcastle, UNSW and Sydney offer 'bonus points' for students who achieved a certain mark or band (usually Band 5 or 6) in a particular HSC subject that is relevant to the degree at university they wish to study; for example, Band 6 in 2U Math's might earn additional 2 ATAR points at UNSW for a Science degree. Students MUST check individual university websites for this information. Some calculate this automatically, others may have an application process.

UAC PREFERENCES

Generally, students must place in rank order **up to 9 preferences** on the UAC application for universities in NSW / ACT. Separate additional applications can be made in each State in Australia. Preferences should be listed in order of what you most want to do. For example:

- 1 Dream course what you would REALLY like to do even if you don't think you will get the ATAR
- 2/3 Ideal course what you would be happy with if you did not get your 1st preference and might be able to use to transfer into preferred option the following year
- 4/5/6 Realistic course what you would be willing to do if you did not get your higher preferences and might be able to use to transfer into a preferred option the following year
- 7/8/9 Foot in the door course a 'lower ATAR' course you would do just to get into university. Do well and try to transfer into a preferred course the following year based on your academic record at university.

However, if you are applying for Early Entry as a BACKUP plan, one of these courses must be listed 1st to secure an early round offer in December. The early round offer should be accepted and then the order of preferences can be changed before the main round on January. CHECK UAC BOOK FOR CUT OFF DATES.


EDUCATION ACCESS SCHEME - EAS

Each University has a scheme to give additional consideration to students who have suffered some sort of disadvantage during their HSC – disability, illness, death of immediate family member, homelessness, abuse, criminal proceedings etc. See your Careers Adviser in Term 3 for an EAS form or download one from the UAC website. It is important that you check such details with each university you apply for – they are all different and some have additional forms you need to complete.






