

NO AEROSOLS AT SCHOOL

Some members of Gloucester High School suffer severe allergies to aerosol sprays or perfumes that can act as a trigger to an (often) serious asthma attack, or bring on a severe migraine. The allergy can be sufficiently serious to put a student into anaphylactic shock if an aerosol can has been used anywhere in the student's vicinity. This can be a life threatening situation.

- Aerosols are banned from school premises, excursions, sporting events and all events where students are in confined spaces.
- Students are encouraged to follow correct hygiene procedures by applying deodorant at home after showering: a good deodorant will last all day if applied to clean skin before dressing
- Roll-on and stick deodorants are permitted at school

Remember: No student is to use or bring aerosol deodorants or sprays to school. Teachers have been asked to confiscate any aerosol products found at school and bring them to the Deputy Principal. Parents will be informed that the products have been collected from their son or daughter and that they can call into the school and collect the product. Further infringements will be dealt with through the discipline system.

SEEKING TO MAKE HISTORY



Friday 26 August Gloucester High's Mock Trial team participated in the sixth round of the state wide NSW Law Society Mock Trial Competition. The trial was held in the newest Court Complex in NSW at Coffs Harbour. As usual this meant going through a security and metal detector system. Fortunately team members reminded Laura Dunlop to leave her scissors on the bus this time and we passed through without incident however the other team was caught out and had their scissors taken into custody. Gloucester was competing against Lismore's Trinity Catholic College in this round. The court was presided over by Magistrate Heather McKinnon, a veteran of 35 years of Mock Trials and she gave us an introduction to the new court complex.

The matter we contested was a criminal case, in which Gloucester represented the police prosecution of defendant Jack Tan, a stunt motor bike riding actor. He was charged with Common Assault in a road rage incident. The Prosecution case was that Jack Tan had forced a Taxi Driver (Laura Dunlop) off the road and struck the driver multiple times over a driving incident that had occurred in the CBD of Sydney minutes earlier. The police (Jasmin L'Green) case was frustrated by the fact that a crucial witness, a passenger in the back seat of the taxi fled the scene without leaving any details and CCT footage from the Taxi went missing and so the reliance on just the two opposing party's evidence meant that Jack Tan was acquitted as reasonable doubt was established. Gloucester's two barristers, Mason Parker and Blake Steadman were excellent and the magistrate heaped praise on Blake, saying he was one of the best barristers she had seen. Of course the performance of our barristers was enhanced by the skillful support of solicitor Ruby Pippen, whose in-trial notetaking and elbow jabbing prompting, made our barristers work even more effectively. Our two witnesses, Laura Dunlop and Jasmin L'Green have in each trial proved superior to the opposition and scored significantly better than their opposition on this occasion. Our Magistrates Associate, Kelsey Woollett was highly effective despite being called into the team only 24 hours prior to the trial.

In a mock trial the most important part of the trial is not the verdict but the point score for each team. Our team won the points tussle 270 to 254 in convincing fashion and now progress to the last round of eliminations before the quarter finals. They are one of the last 16 schools in the state competition which started with 160 schools both public and private schools (including the GPS School). This level in the competition has been reached by only one other GHS team in the last 20 years. In 2003, a team that was composed of Jess Lyford, Jess King, Josie Hampton, Brooke Drinkwater, Sarah Gandley and Kasey Towers. Two of these students went on to become practising lawyers, one a legal secretary, one became a nurse, another a primary school teacher and one a corporate leader in defence systems. What will this next crop go on to achieve, time will tell. We wish them well as they seek to make history and enter the final stages of this prestigious competition.

GLOUCESTER SCHOOL TRI CHALLENGE

There are two weeks left to the annual running of the Gloucester High School Tri Challenge on the last day of this Term, Friday 23 September. Participants should be well into their training for the 10km ride, 4km kayak and 4km run. Below is some general information for parents about the running of the event.

ATTENDANCE - As this is a normal school day all students are expected to take part as either a competitor or a race marshal. Please note that there will be no teaching staff or students left at GHS after 9.45am (This is the time that the buses leave to take the students out to the course). Students will be bussed to their positions on the course. A permission note indicating cost will be sent out in Week 10.

STUDENT COURSE MARSHALS - The student race marshals are stationed around the course with a supervising teacher to encourage and assist the competitors where necessary. Students will be out on the course between 10am and 1pm so will need to take water and snacks, as well as closed in shoes (no thongs, or sandals) and appropriate sun protection.


FOOD – Students will need to bring their own drinks and snacks for when they are on the course between 10am and 1pm. A BBQ lunch will be available when students return to Rocky Crossing (approx. 1pm). Prices will be advised with the permission note in Week 10.

RACE ENTRIES - Entries closed on Friday 9 September. Entry forms and money should have been handed in to the school office. Entry fees are \$45 for an individual or \$75 for a team, which includes hiring of the kayaks and bus fares to and from the event. Kayak Training - Kayak paddlers will be completing their kayak training session with Barrington Outdoor Adventure Centre on Friday 16 September at a cost of approximately \$45.00 per student. Permission notes, BOAC indemnity forms and training day details will be sent out this week and will need to be returned, fully completed before Friday 16 Sept.

BIKE CHECK – All competitors will need to have their bike checked in Week 10 before Race Day, to ensure that the brakes and gears are fully functional. This will be done at school. Bikes should

be left in the racks outside the TAS block with the students name clearly shown on the bike, and notify Mr Leighton that it needs to be checked. Please be aware competitors should be using mountain bikes – no racing bikes will be considered eligible for the race.

TAFE (TVET) FOR YEARS 9, 10 AND 11

The 2017 TVET Course Guide has been distributed to all Year 9, 10 and 11 students who showed interest. It is essential that all applications are submitted directly to Mr De Angelis in the Careers Office. The enrolment process is now organised through a system known as EVET (External Vocational Education and Training). There are very strict guidelines, and the cut-off dates MUST be adhered to. All applications must be in by September 16.

All students who enrol in EVET must first obtain an USI Number (Unique Student Identifier). The 10 digit USI number will stay with the student (students of any age) for the rest of their life. Meaning, most people in society will need to obtain a USI when they complete any vocational training including WH&S White Card, First Aid, etc. Some students may already have a USI and they need to write this directly on their TVET application. However, if one needs to be obtained, I'm happy to help. The easiest and most successful way is to have the student come see me in the Careers Office during Lunch or Recess. They need to bring a photograph (on their Mobile phone) of their Medicare Card. Their name must appear on the Medicare Card and they must have an Individual Reference Number (usually 1-7). I only ask for a photograph so they don't risk losing their card, however, using the original card is fine. With the details on their Medicare Card and general information about their personal details we should be able to acquire the USI. The only question students sometimes have difficulty answering is: "Place of birth"? So if this information is known there shouldn't be any issues. Feel free to "Create USI" at home. If all goes well, it only takes about 5 minutes to complete.

If students and parents have discussed TAFE as an option and know what students want to study, please see me as soon as possible. It's better for me to finalise this earlier, rather than rushing through several applications at the last minute. Call Mr De Angelis at school any time if you have questions or concerns.

YEAR 10 STUDENTS DISTANCE EDUCATION

It's important that all Year 10 students who plan on studying a single course in 2016 through distance education complete an Expression of Interest Form ASAP for Camden Haven High School Distance Education Centre. Year 10 students who want to enrol for a single TAFE course, at the Taree or Great Lakes Campuses, or even through Distance Education need to complete an Expression of Interest form by Week 9. This form also requires a USI Number. See Mr De Angelis for the forms and to discuss different options.


YEAR 9 STUDENTS 'TRY A TRADE' DAY WEDNESDAY 21 SEPTEMBER

AUSTRALIA! STORY COUNTRY

Children's Book Week on 23 August was a celebration of creativity and storytelling. Special guests were writer Chris Dean and illustrator Adele Compton whose passion it was to share their exciting Bruce the Bush Rat journey with a group of students from Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11. Bruce the Bush Rat is a humorous story about a country rat (Bruce) who explores the delights and dangers of the big smoke. He returns to his home with his new city friends and introduces them to the peculiarities of country life. Bubbling underneath these dual plots is the urge to be adventurous.

Adele has been drawing rats ('big bums, always long legs and unique footwear, but not cartoonish') for years. When her good friend Chris Dean joined Adele's 'rat bubble' they threw ideas around and fantasised – before finally deciding to work together on a book. The project took two years to come to fruition, including the difficult but rewarding task of self-publishing. Although Chris spent hours writing and editing, she enjoyed the process and stated that it was always fun. Adele spent days working out how to match Chris's words with washedwatercolour illustrations. 'I had to be creative every day,' Adele revealed. Both artists produced heaps of drafts before committing to either the final illustrations or written text. They agreed that the many drafts (including the many mistakes) were an essential part of the creative 'growing process'. Chris felt that at times she had too many ideas and had to get rid of some; Adele became so immersed in the main character that, in her words, she literally 'became Bruce'.

Chris Dean started writing after she retired and moved away from Barrington. She joined a writing club, completed a creative writing course and learnt from other writers. Chris emphasised that it's best to write about things you are familiar with – what you know, have seen, experienced – and recommended that showing, not telling is more effective than describing.

Adele Compton is a keen member of the local Arts community. In addition to creating quirky illustrations, Adele crafts colourful hand-felted beanies. For Adele, illustrating is all about simple lines, freedom rather than neatness, colour and a fascination with body language. Chris and Adele stressed the need to be flexible with ideas – artists have to make decisions and go with the flow. Also, both agreed that eavesdropping and observing other people can trigger ideas. So beware..! The workshop was informative, interactive, engaging and entertaining. Chris and Adele's warmth and enthusiasm made for one very special Book Week presentation.









MIA BOWDEN IN FRANCE

It can't possibly be already August. My body quivers and aches from the emotion and stress when I start to think about how little time I have left in France. I can't help but think to four months ahead when I will have to leave this dream year behind me. I need more time. I have so many adventures I want to experience and so many more people I want to meet. The opportunities are amazing on exchange and I don't want to have to go back home where I have to settle back into 'the normal'. Thinking four months ahead I'm already missing the excitement of making new friends, the ability to immerse myself in so many weird and wonderful new experiences, and my French home. To my family's and friends' disapproval I feel I am ready to live another year in France. I can't imagine leaving it behind.

Reaching August has made me incredibly enthusiastic. I feel I need to get out and do more. To make the most of the last months in France and do all the things I dreamed I would do. I don't want to reach late December with regrets about my exchange.

August, the last month of Summer holidays. The Canon family and I kicked off this beautiful and sunny month with a few days relaxing on the coast of Bretagne (Brittany). We stayed at a cousin's holiday house in Saint-Briac Sur Mer and I had an incredible time. It did rain for most of the trip but I didn't mind as the clouds and rain made the famously cold 'Manche' (The English Channel) warm enough to swim in. Everyday we went to the beach and swam over and under the big beautiful waves. We made day trips to Saint Malo and I was so excited because once again I was able to eat the one and only Sanchez ice-cream (the best ice-cream in the whole wide world. Do you have brownie slices and tiramisu textures in your ice-cream?). After those fantastic four days we headed back home to the farm and the very next day we left again on the big family vacation.

Our plan was to casually make our way down to the South of France, to Fraise de Corbieres, where family friends have a holiday house and invite the Canons and another family every year. We set off the afternoon of Saturday the 6th. Our first adventure was when we stopped at La Guerche, at the South of the department. La Guerche is a family friend's castle I talked about staying the night in, in one of my previous YEPPER's. In the South and typically in 'La Ville Rose' ('The Pink City' – Toulouse), all the houses and buildings are constructed with striking pinky orange brick and often contrast with white features. It's so beautiful walking among streets filled with so much colour. On the outskirts of Toulouse, we stayed with my host mum's sister and then the next night, moving further south east, we camped in the French countryside. The resort was great and we stayed for 2 nights, making a day trip to Cartes on the Thursday. Friday morning, we packed up the campsite and hit the road again for the last leg of the road trip. We arrived in Fraise de Corbieres at around 6pm and headed straight for the pool.

The South of France is absolutely stunning. It didn't rain at all for the 5 days we stayed there which allowed us to spend our days by the pool, relaxing and enjoying the Southern sun. We mostly spent our time curled up in sofa chairs with a book or playing cards at the house, but we made sure to get out and make an adventure each day. We did so many activities such as: 'bush' walking, visited the ruins of a castle, swam in the Mediterranean Sea and attended a 'Sardinade'. A 'Sardinade' is a festival typical of the South of France. Basically people of all ages get together to eat sardines, listen to music and have a good time. It was a great night but I have to say I was more than a little shocked when the waitress dropped 5 WHOLE sardines (eyes, head, bones, you name it) on my plate. I was sitting with my host sisters and we tried to stifle our laughter as we were being served. Tuesday the 16th marked 7 months on exchange for me and also sadly, the day we reloaded the minivan and started the long drive home. Fraise de Corbieres to Chemille Sur Deme is a six-and-a-half-hour drive. I was so relieved when we slumbered out of the car at 9ish and headed up to our own rooms and to sleep. The next week I spent relaxing and recovering from the holiday. It was great being able to repose at the farm. I spent my days reading French books, playing the piano and occasionally heading to Agricultural festivals, or to Tours with my family. Then on the 27th something exciting happened.

On the morning of the 27 August, Roseline, my host sister, invited me to go with her and my other host sisters to my host mum's surprise vacation in Saint Malo. Of course I said yes but the problem was I had to change host families on the 31 August. The four days I planned on having to organise quickly got sliced down to a few hours as we planned on leaving the next day, Sunday 28 August. I headed straight to my room and starting chucking all my belongings in my suitcases and bags, packing for when I change host families. I tried to organise my suitcase for Saint Malo and at the same time tried to celebrate with Samuel (youngest host brother) for his birthday party that was happening the same day. I somehow got ready and had prepared and organised most things.



We had an absolutely amazing weekend! The first afternoon when we arrived we swam in the ocean as the sun set. I thought this was so strange because in Australia we are taught to never go in the water after 5pm because of sharks. I was so happy floating on my back over the waves, watching the colours change in the sky. The next day we spent the afternoon at a very fancy spa. I'd never been to one before and the Canon girls surprised Odile with a package and treatments. I felt so grateful and lucky that they had invited me to come along. It was so posh and fancy, and I had a great time, receiving waterbed machine massages and private bath Jacuzzis. That afternoon we all ate galletes in Saint Malo together and got my favourite 'Sanchez' ice-cream and walked along the walls of the town. We then headed back to the beach near our house and took pictures and laughed together as the sun set. I ended up making ANZAC biscuits at 10pm that night in the holiday house in Saint Malo.

The next day we had to head home from Saint Malo to Chemille. That same night was my last night with the Canons. We had a big and delicious dinner in celebration of my time with them. For dessert we ate my ANZAC biscuits and also Kouign-amann, which is a pastry typical of Bretagne. The French joke that it is THE unhealthiest thing to eat in France. They say that it is a lot of butter, a lot of sugar and a sprinkle of flour... and it's true, but it's so delicious! It was very sad having to say goodbye to the Canons. They were such a great host family and I'm going to miss them so much. I'm now living in Tours again with the Delavault family. I have a host mum, Benedict, a host dad, Allan, an older host sister who studies at University (Margaux), a 16-year-old host brother (Jules) and a younger 8-year-old host brother (Emilien). I'm very excited about living with the Delavaults and getting to know them.

My three-month Summer Holiday has ended and it's time for me to go back to school. I start on the 1st of September. I'm a little nervous about starting courses again and seeing everyone after three months. However, I feel that being at school my French will improve much faster so I'm keen to get my brain working again after such a long break.
