#### **NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM 2017**

The final vaccination dated for 2017 is Term 4, Thursday 16 November 2017. PLEASE NOTE THIS CHANGE OF DATE.

#### WHAT IF MY CHILD HAS MISSED A VACCINE

If your child has missed any vaccinations they will be offered any missed doses at the next clinic at the school.

WHAT IF MY CHILD HAS NOT RECEIVED ALL HPV VACCINES BEFORE THE END OF 2017? Any Year 7 student with missed doses of HPV vaccine can be caught up in 2018.

#### ADDITIONALLY:

- Any 2017 Year 8 student who commenced HPV vaccination while in Year 7 and are yet to finish the course of HPV (and who has not received any from their local doctor) can still receive this at the next clinic at their school.
- Any Year 11 or 12 student who returned a signed consent card for Meningococcal ACWY vaccine and did not
  receive this in Term 2 (and who has not received it from their local doctor) can still receive this at the next clinic
  at their school.

#### Please note:

• As of July 2017 any student who has missed school program vaccines or any childhood vaccines can now receive these vaccines from their local doctor. For more information please refer to www.immunise.health.gov.au and click on "National immunisation program – expansion".

Don't forget a Record of Vaccination is given to each student for each vaccination. Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

Congratulations Courtney on an amazing effort, breaking the 800m records at two recent carnivals.




#### **LIBRARY MATTERS: Digital Citizenship**

### KIA ORA, TĒNĀ KOUTOU - JESS RETURNS FROM NEW ZEALAND

Hello, greetings to you.

The last three months would have to be the most remarkable three months of my life. I landed in New Zealand, the Land of the Long White Cloud, on 24 June. The flight away from home was sad. I was flying away from my family and friends to make a home in a different country 2,223 kilometres away. After a three hour flight, and changing seats three times, I finally made it to New Zealand. I took a deep breath and turned to Keely, a girl on the exchange, and said, "I smell sheep." We both smiled and walked through Customs.

Mollie Te Brake was my exchange match. She was in Australia and stayed with my family and attended Gloucester High School from 24 April to 24 June. Mollie's mother and father were there to greet us at Auckland International Airport. After we farewelled the other exchange students we got a taxi to the Pullman, a hotel where I stayed regularly on the exchange with Mollie and her family. The next day we flew to Keri Keri where Mollie's grandparents and friends were

waiting.

Mollie lives at Manganui in Doubtless Bay where the fish and chip shop is apparently "famous". Manganui means "big shark", though I never saw a big shark. But they did have lots of fish.

The weeks flew by and, before I knew it, it was time for the safari. The safari is a time when all the Australian exchange students get together for a week and have an absolute blast. We started off in Keri Keri and made our way down to Auckland, a three hour drive where we picked up more Australian Exchange Students. We then



travelled to Taupo Lake, New Zealand's largest lake which can be seen from outer space. This is where we met up with the rest of the exchange students. In total there were fourteen Rotary International Youth Exchange students in our group. We all had so much fun together and it was a blast to spend time with people in the same situation.

The first day of safari was "Bonding". None of us thought we needed to bond since we already felt connected to each other. "Bonding" was fun. We all picked a group leader. Tom Brody and I were selected. It turns out that we weren't such great leaders because it took us fifteen minutes to guide our team to finish the puzzle. The best time to complete the puzzle was six minutes and was done by 12 year olds! After that we had lunch and hung out in the lounge room and talked about our time in New Zealand.

The week went too fast. During that week, I made life-long friends. The week consisted of many activities such as, going downhill in a Zorb,

getting tossed around in a jet boat ride at the Huka Falls, racing around at the Luge, boiling in hot pools, skiing a volcano and jumping/swinging off a platform 47m above the Waikato River.

By the end of the exchange Mollie and I grew closer and we treated each other like sisters more than friends. I was sad to leave Mollie's family but I was so happy to see my family.

I would encourage anyone to do the three month Rotary Youth Exchange. This exchange has taught me that I cannot pronounce Maori words but those attempts and the people who tried to teach me will forever be held dear to me.

I particularly would like to thank Gloucester Rotary Club for their support and sponsorship of this amazing program.

#### TARONGA ZOO EXCURSION

On Thursday 19 October, Year 7 and Year 11 Biology students went to Taronga Zoo Park in Sydney. We went to see the Seal Show and Bird Show. There was a Classification workshop for Year 7 and Maintaining a Balance workshop for Year 11.

In the workshop, Year 7 students had opportunities to see a variety of organisms to determine their physical characteristics and use scientific terminology to describe them. They patted a variety of reptiles and a baby possum!

In groups, Year 11 Biology students presented to the zoo's Biologists a range of five minute talks prepared in class on a chosen animal. They were then introduced to a range of live animals and given instructions on the subtle ways in which Australian animals have adapted to their environment.

#### Year 10 Careers Classes:

This term, during Careers lessons, all students MUST complete the Mandatory Board of Studies requirements for the , "All My Own Work" (AMOW) Program. The HSC: All My Own Work program is designed to help Higher School Certificate students to follow the principles and practices of good scholarship. This includes understanding and valuing ethical practices when locating and using information as part of their HSC studies.

The program has been developed as part of the NSW Government's Respect and Responsibility strategy and complements other approaches such as brochures for teachers, students and parents and strengthened student and teacher declarations for the HSC.

The HSC: All My Own Work program is integrated with other NSW syllabuses and programs. The program is designed to be delivered flexibly as self-paced learning modules.

The program's content is divided into five modules:

- 1. Scholarship Principles and Practices
- 2. Acknowledging Sources
- 3. Plagiarism
- 4. Copyright
- 5. Working with others

#### Each module contains:

- Information and advice on the module focus questions
- Quiz questions
- Summary
- Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)
- Link to a glossary
- Links to relevant websites.

In a nutshell, AMOW provides students with a contemporary and relevant understanding of how to avoid plagiarism. Please note: Students are unable to be enrolled as Year 11 Students until this requirement is fulfilled. All students will need to complete all 5 Module Quizzes.
