

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE (BYOD)

All students are encouraged to bring their own laptops to school for use in class and for seamless use then at home. We are committed to moving students and staff forward in a contemporary learning environment. The school plan is to transition to better use of technology within our classrooms, with a target over the next few years of a device for each and every student. This does not mean students will be on devices 100% of the time, but that teachers can incorporate learning that can increase student engagement. Technology can also allow students to work at different levels in the same class. There are many possibilities and we want to equip students, as they will use technology in their professional lives.



Students in Year 11 and 12 are now expected to bring their own device and all other years are encouraged to do so also, however in 2021, we will be starting up a specific Year 7 BYOD program.

BYOD Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Why is Gloucester High School going to a BYOD model?

We are committed to continuing to move students and staff forward in a contemporary learning environment. Part of our School Plan is to transition to better use of technology and incorporate technology into our classrooms, with a target over the next few years, that each student will have their own device.

Many students already have devices, or parents are considering buying them for them in high school. It is better for the student to be working with their own device (providing their own 'one stop shop'), for their own work consistency.

It also means when a class starts, there is no delay in collecting/returning laptops and students logging in – students are ready to go. We have found that this can waste up to 20 or more minutes of our valuable teaching time.

This does not mean students will be on devices 100% of the time, but that teachers can incorporate learning that can increase fun and student engagement.

This could be utilising digital textbooks (i.e. math) which are then available at home, using apps or perhaps the Internet to research. Technology can also allow students to work at different levels in the same class.

There are many possibilities, and we want to equip students, as they will use technology in their professional lives.

What years are required to BYOD in 2021?

Students in Year 11 and 12 are now required to bring their own device, as it is an essential learning and studying tool for them at school. All other years are encouraged and will be supported to BYOD.

In 2021, we will be starting up a specific Year 7 BYOD program, with the aim that students either start the year with their own laptop, or they plan to purchase one sometime during 2021. The table below shows the BYOD requirements by year/year level.

If I provide a laptop, I am concerned that my child's device will get stolen or damaged in the playground.

The school will be implementing lockers that will be available for all students at a minimal cost of \$10 per year. Some of these lockers will be under CCTV surveillance.

We also recommend that you buy a good case to protect your child's laptop. The HP BYOD portal has great cases available at reasonable prices. Some are included in laptop packages also, to make it simpler for you to purchase the right one.

Will the school take any responsibility for damage/theft to student laptops that occur at school?

No, the school is not responsible for student owned devices.

Will student use of the internet be monitored at school?

All student usage of the school's network and internet connection is filtered. Their complete web history is also logged and able to be tracked. Parents need to be aware that if they provide their child with a device with direct 3G/4G access, the school is unable to filter, log and monitor the student's usage. 3G/4G enabled devices should be avoided.

Will students be able to recharge their device during the day?

No. WHS issues will prevent students from recharging their devices. Students will need to cultivate the habit of charging their device overnight and only using them for specific purposes during the day.

The school may look into a communal (supervised) charging station for students at a later date.

I am concerned that if my child has a laptop, they will just install games on it and do other things that I do not understand.

The school will provide a BYOD handbook which will provide some information on parental control options for Windows devices.

What policies and structures will guide the students' use of Technology?

Existing policies including the <u>Student use of digital devices and online services</u> and the GHS Student Use of Digital Devices and Online Services Procedure outline the school's approach to regulating the use of technology and incorporating BYOD into the teaching and learning framework of the school.

Why is the school using a Windows 10 and Microsoft office platform?

After examining the benefits and issues with various platforms, the school has decided to specify a Windows 10 platform. This ensures that the devices will be able to connect to the wireless network and operate within the current school infrastructure. Windows 10 will also allow students to operate with the Microsoft range of office software (standard in most career environments) and also has the required features to support future program additions.

Why does the BYOD requirement specify an active pen?


An active pen provides a number of functions. It operates as a mouse would and can be used to navigate, select and access context sensitive menus. However, its main use is to be able to write directly onto the surface of the screen. As a tablet device, this allows students to interact directly with information on the screen, without needing to use pen and paper.

Students are able to edit documents, make notes, correct and mark work, complete forms on the device that are electronic but not easily able to be typed onto. In particular students are able to use the active pen for science and art for drawing.

Won't students just be staring at screens all day?

No. Students will use their devices when necessary in class. We will have a policy of having devices switched off and out of sight during non-class times, with exceptions (such as supervised in the library).

Are we getting rid of pen and paper?

No. We operate in an environment where the HSC credential still requires students to hand write examinations, so students will need to maintain and develop this skill with their final examinations in mind. In addition, there are some forms of learning and recording information that are better suited to pen and paper. We anticipate that there will be a place for writing and ICT in schools in the foreseeable future.




HSC VISUAL ART 2020


Six of our students sat for the HSC Visual Arts course this year. All students produced excellent work from their efforts despite the interruption to the continuity of the course thanks to COVID-19.



Gloucester High School Year 10 Drama presents STORIES IN THE DARK

Gloucester High School's Year 10 Drama production has been a mainstay at the school for the past 17 years. This year students will be taking a turn for the dramatic by staging Stories in the Dark by Debra Oswald, a play that explores the power of storytelling, mingling the magic and earthy wisdom of folk tales with the hard-edged story of violence, conflict and the struggle to survive. Stories in the Dark will be staged in the **school hall** on **Friday December 11 at 7pm and Saturday December 12 at 2:00pm and 7:00pm.**

In *Stories in the Dark,* Thomas, a terrified 12-year-old boy, finds himself separated from his family in the unfamiliar streets of a war torn city. He takes refuge in a bombed-out house and, in the total blackness his bravado, crumbles into tears. Into his life steps Anna – older, street smart and scornful of his crying. As a way of shutting the boy up, she starts to tell him a story that she vaguely remembers from her own childhood. And so begins a journey into the shifting, shimmering world of ogres, princes, singing bones, foolish lads and wolf-mothers.

Stories in the Dark will be performed by the talented students of Gloucester High School's Year 10 Drama class. The students have been working on the play since Term 3 and will present it for high school students during the day on Friday December 11 before opening it up to the general public that night. As a Covid-safe school, Gloucester High School will have social distancing and contact tracing regulations in place.

The cast is led by Anita Jackson and Melia Gauci-Mulder, who will share the role of Anna, and Lynelle Hester and Brooke Willis, who will share the role of Thomas. They will receive top notch support from Savannah Ashby, Emma Elder, Haylee Mathew, Sadbh Renshaw, Anna-Rose Seale, Jessie Stewart and Emily Walker. The production is directed by our Drama teacher Scott Davis.

Previous Answer:

We need to know the number of boxes that were packaged in order to find the total selling price. The number of boxes is obtained by dividing 100 by $11/4:100 \div 5/4 = 100 \times 4/5 = 80$. The selling price is $80 \times $1.75 = 140

The Start of it All





Walking to school safely

Never too old to be safe

Pedestrians and drivers have a shared responsibility on and near roads and need to look after each other.

Staying safe while out walking:

- · plan your walking routes
- · avoid busy roads, if possible
- choose the safest place to cross
- walk the extra distance to use a pedestrian crossing, traffic island, pedestrian lights or overhead bridge, if available
- walk on the far right hand side of the road facing oncoming traffic, when there is no footpath.

Before you cross the road:

 unplug your earphones and put away your phone

 avoid crossing between parked cars or at the front or back of buses and large vehicles

 at intersections, check for turning vehicles before you leave the kerb

look out before you step out.

Using pedestrians crossings

- stop at the kerb until cars have completely stopped, as drivers don't always see you
- try and make eye contact with the driver before you cross, so you know they have seen you
- · wait for the walk signal
- don't enter the road if the red 'Don't walk' signal shows
- when safe, promptly walk across the road, continually scanning and listening for oncoming traffic.
