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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

We acknowledge that the past two years have been very challenging for our students, yet they have shown resilience and determination to persevere under these circumstances. It was unfortunate that we had to cancel the Year 12 Graduation Assembly this Friday. We are looking at alternate options that meet Covid guidelines. On behalf of the school community, we wish Year 12 well in their exams and their future endeavours.

MATHS CORNER QUESTION (for students and parents)

Question:

If 16 is added to one-third of a number; the result is three times the number. What is the number?

Previous Answer:

Strategy: Consider the common multiples of 4 and 5. If we had 3 students more, there would be no students left over for groups of 4 or for groups of 5. The positive multiples of 4 and 5 are 20, 40, 60, etc. If we now subtract the three students we added earlier, our possible answers will be 17, 37, 57, etc. Then, **the least number of students the class could have is 17.**

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE PROGRAM (BYOD)

All students are encouraged to bring their own laptops to school for use in class and for seamless use then at home. We are committed to moving students and staff forward in a contemporary learning environment. The school plan is to transition to better use of technology within our classrooms, with a target over the next few years of a device for each and every student.

This does not mean students will be on devices 100% of the time, but that teachers can incorporate learning that can increase student engagement. Technology can

also allow students to work at different levels in the same class. There are many possibilities and we want to equip students, as they will use technology in their professional lives.

Many students already have devices, or parents are considering buying them for them in high school. It is better for the student to be working with their own device (providing their own 'one stop shop'), for their own work consistency.

What years are required to BYOD in 2022?

Students in Years 7, 8, 11 and 12 are now expected to bring their own device, and Years 9 and 10 are strongly encouraged to do so also. Any student that brings a device to school will be offered support to connect to the network and get software available free from the Department (i.e. Microsoft Office).

We know that this is a big investment, and to assist parents in their choices, we have partnered with HP to get good pricing and support, and also interest free purchases should you need it. Click **'here'** for more information on our website or refer to the flyer within this newsletter.

YEAR 7 TREE PLANTING

Students were treated to a demonstration lesson from Mrs Cameron who is an expert in this area. Mrs Cameron showed the students how to cover a cake, how to avoid 'crumbing', working with the cake on a board and how to use a piping bag correctly. Students put many hours and time into their designs and the finished products speak for themselves. The birthday cakes were an Assessment Task for the context area Food For Special Occasions. SCHOOLS' MERINO WETHER CHALLENGE

Earlier in the year, our Year 9 Agriculture class decided to enter the NSW Annual Schools' Merino Wether Challenge where we would get 6 sheep to break in and produce the best wool and meat.

Over the months, every Ag lesson we had, we would be down at the ag farm rounding up our sheep, weighing them and putting halters on them. At the beginning the sheep didn't like it, they would throw themselves on the ground but the more we worked with them and kept them quiet the quicker they started walking around and doing everything they were taught to do.

Year 9 Ag did such an amazing job of breaking the sheep in and fattening them up, we won in the Coastal Region and came in the top 3rd overall, competing against 142 teams and 370 sheep.

Team A came 42nd out 142 teams overall in the state.

Team B came 48th out of 142 teams overall in the state.

On behalf of the Year 9 Ag class, we would like to thank the school for allowing this extra-curricular activity in a hard year of Covid-19, if it wasn't for the school we wouldn't have come this far and achieved these amazing results. Thank you.

SCONE BEEF BONANZA

It has been an interesting year for our show team. Our last actual show was Newcastle in March. More recently our students have been busily preparing for the Upper Hunter Beef Bonanza Show at Scone, which took place on 24 October. We sent seven animals that were generously donated to our school. The steers looked good leaving for the 3.5hr trip to Scone, transported by "Johno" Johnston. They were judged on the hoof in pens. Due to Covid, the students were unable to attend but the show was put on social media so students could see the judging of their cattle. This allowed the students and breeders to see the results and hear the judges' comments, which gave an idea as to what they were looking for on the day.

The animals, at the time of writing this report, have only been judged on part of the competition. However, we have already received the following results:

- Speckle Park x "Rebel" 4th middleweight class 2 (421-460kg)
- Angus "Mackas Rosco" highly commended middleweight class 5A (541-580kg)
- Angus x Limo " Roy Roy" 4th middleweight class 5B (541-580kg)
- Charolais x Limo "Romeo" 3rd heavyweight class 6 (581-620kg)
- Angus "Boambee Rascal" 3rd heavyweight class 7 (621kg+)
