

Our school is committed to continuing to move students and staff forward in a contemporary learning environment, so we will be continuing the journey we began in 2020 with COVID and remote learning, by continuing our BYOD program. Our goal (and part of our School Plan) is to continue to transition to better use of technology and incorporate technology into our classroom. Our target is for a device for each student. We want our students to be proficient as they move past high school, into the digital world.

We have now been running our BYOD program successfully in 2021 and 2022. In 2023, all students are moving into the BYOD program. This means if you child is in Year 9 or Year 10 in 2022, they will now need to BYOD for 2023.

Need to buy a laptop for your child?

The primary aim of getting a student personal computer (PC) for your child is to support learning. To do this, it's important that the machine has the appropriate features and speed. It has been our experience that cheaper machines are often slower, do not have the correct features, are flimsy in design, or have short warranties. Quite often they don't last the minimum distance that we expect to achieve from a PC.

We recognise that researching the many devices and operating systems that are available can be difficult, so we set out to assist parents with finding devices of a good standard and convenient warranty. We wish they were cheaper for our families, but the cheaper ones often do not support learning.

We know that this is a big investment, and to assist parents in their choices, we have partnered with HP to get good pricing and support, and interest free purchases should you need it. See below for more information or click here for more information on our website.

Should you wish to purchase elsewhere, we have listed below the minimum specifications for a laptop, or you can find it here on our website.

We have chosen laptops that have the right functionality and well powered to see your child through at least 3 years at school. The advantage of purchasing these laptops is that:

- they are cheaper than retail prices
- they come with a full 3 years of on-site support HP will come to you or to the school to fix warranty issues (most laptops have a 1-year warranty when bought from a shop).
- you can choose payment options AfterPay or Finance (contact Katrina at HP on 0438 898 814)
- you can choose (at a very reasonable cost) Accidental Damage Insurance. We suggest that you check any existing Home Contents insurance first as this may cover your child's laptop.
- You can buy discounted accessories such as cases (around \$50), which we recommend as an essential additional to your laptop purchase.

Minimum Requirements

Please note that the below are the minimum specifications. Anything above this will mean the device will likely function better for your child and last longer, as software updates over time are getting larger and use more space and resources.

Please do not hesitate to contact the school if you are looking to purchase a device and would like advice if it is suitable.

Specifications:

- 64 Bit processor, suggested minimum Intel i3 (Gen 11) or AMD Ryzen 3
- 8GB RAM (16GB recommended, and required for Digital Photography students)
- Minimum 128GB drive (Solid State Drive (SSD))
- Screen resolution of at least 1366x768 (high definition (HD))
- Keyboard, for typing (i.e. not a tablet with a screen only)
- Touchscreen (active pen compatible)
- Active pen
- A 2-in-1 device (this will 'flip' to a tablet and allows students to draw/write easily)
- USB-C Charging
- Ability to connect earphones/headphones.
- Minimum battery life of 8 hours
- · Light weight, under 1.5 kg
- Case for protection in school bag (recommended)
- Mouse (plug in type optional)
- Warranty: consider how long this is and how long to expect from the laptop you are purchasing. Check how long it is and what type (i.e. on-site repair or do you need to post it for repair)

Preferred:

• Windows 10/11 (NOT S mode)

We recommend strongly you do not purchase a Chromebook or Android Tablet, nor an iPad. We have found that these devices lack the ease of use and integration with other technology in our classrooms.

We request USB-C charging where possible, as these are chargers we have at school, so will be able to assist with charging laptops from time to time.

Please do not provide Internet data (via smart phones or 3G/4G dongles), as GHS provides secure (child safe) Internet at school via the WiFi.

Note that your child receives FREE Microsoft and Adobe software, so there is no extra to purchase other than above.







We are also requiring members of the community with the capacity to become mentor drivers.


